Primary Research Paper


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## **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

The 2017 "Psychopathy" survey was conducted by Annabelle McAlindon of Burlingame High School, those polled were 20 high school seniors. This survey was meant to understand their attitudes and views of psychopathy and psychopaths, and observe the knowledge they had about the topic at hand. Among the key findings were:

- Only 75% of high school seniors knew what the definition of psychopathy was in 2017.
- 95% of those polled either agreed or strongly agree that the term psychopath has a negative connotation to it.
- 15% of high school seniors strongly disagree with the statement that psychopathy is an inherited disorder and encoded in our genetics.
- 30% of students strongly agree with the statement that psychopathy is developed through our environment.


Only 75% of high school seniors knew what the definition of psychopathy was in 2017.



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

This means that these students have seen something about psychopathy in their lives and it has left a lasting negative connotation in their lives.
